

Local Author to Present chronology of Mexican Movies in the United States, and their Impact on the History, Culture and Film Industry of South Texas.

The RGV Film Commission and the McAllen Heritage Center will host the first Reel Series Seminars with local author, and owner of the Agrasanchez Film Archive, Rogelio Agrasanchez Jr. The Reel Series Seminars are scheduled for four consecutive Saturdays starting August, 24th at the McAllen Heritage Center. Each seminar will begin promptly at 1:00 p.m. Admission is free.

Both organizations are very excited about introducing this talented local author for the first lecture series, for Agrasanchez Jr. has done extensive research on motion pictures and the identity of Mexicans and Mexican- Americans in the United States. Agrasanchez Jr. believes that these films are a multifaceted expression of culture that can be perceived as art, an educational instrument, a propagandistic tool, and a promoter of values, entertainment and more. He has authored several books such as *Mexican Movies in the United States: A History of Films, Theaters and Audiences 1920-1960, Beauties of the Mexican Cinema, Mexican Horror Cinema,* and his latest *Viaje Redondo: El Cine Mudo Mexicano en los Estados Unidos,* among others. All of his books are available in English and Spanish. Agrasanchez Jr. will be signing his books after each seminar.
